St. John Appo, former publisher of The Army and Navy Register, died on Monday at his home, 561 Fourth Street, Brooklyn, after a short illness, in his eighty-second year. Mr. Appo was a native of Philadelphia. He was connected with The Army and Navy Journal in New York for several years before he took over the publication of The Army and Navy Register. He retired in 1922. He left two sons, the Rev. Locksley A. Appo, rector of the Roman Catholic Church of the Epiphany in Brooklyn, and Garnet Brady Appo; also two daughters, Miss Alice Appo and Miss Martha Appo. Funeral services will be held today at the Church of the Holy Trinity, Brooklyn. Burial will be in Everett, Mass.

Charles A. Breck, 85 years old, who with his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last Sept. 5, died Monday night at his home, 107 Claremont Avenue, Mount Vernon. He was a pioneer settler of Chester Hill, Mount Vernon. For many years he was a partner in the Electro-Light Engraving Company of New York, and retired in 1916. He was born in Penn Yan, N. Y., and had been a resident of Mount Vernon for fifty years. Mr. Breck was a veteran of the Thirteenth Regiment, Company G, N. Y. S. M., having served in the Civil War. He leaves his wife, a son, two daughters and six grandchildren.
