WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Bland's bill as a substitute for the financial bill now before the house provides duties on imports shall be paid half in gold and half in silver. To redeem notes issued under the Sherman act the bullion purchased thereunder shall be coined at the rate of \$10,000,000 per month.
