She was married to Mr. Wesley sixty years ago. Mr. Wesley, who is now eighty-four years old, is still active and vigorous. He has large property interests in Port Chester.

Mrs. Wesley's name before her marriage was Miss Elizabeth Kelley. Her father was William P. Kelley, a dry goods merchant, of New-York City. The family moved from New-York to Buffalo.

Mr. and Mrs. Wesley have lived in Port Chester forty years. They were members of Christ Church, Rye. The funeral services will be held there to-morrow afternoon at 1 o'clock. The Rev. Dr. Kirkby, rector of the church, will officiate.

Mrs. Wesley leaves two children, Mrs. Charles A. Breck of Mount Vernon, and Mrs. Johanna Parsons of Richmond, Va. Mrs. Wesley has nephews and nieces living in Port Chester.

—Mrs. Mary Munger Muldaur, mother of the late Lieut. Commander Alonzo N. Muldaur of the United States steamer Oneida, who lost his life in Yokohama Bay, died at Elizabeth, N. J., yesterday, at her daughter-in-law's residence. She was eighty years old and a native of New-York. Lieut. Commander Muldaur was her only son. Her husband was killed at Puerto Rico, by the bursting of a gun, forty years ago. Her ancestors came to America with Winthrop in 1630.

—Mrs. Elizabeth Bloodgood, wife of John H. Bloodgood, died Tuesday at her home, 6 West Fortieth Street. She was the daughter of the late David Wood. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon, at St. Bartholomew's Church, Madison Avenue and Forty-fourth Street.

—The Rev. John B. Husted, the oldest member of the New-England Conference, died at Watertown, Mass., yesterday. He was born in Alford, Miss., in 1804, joined the New-York Conference in 1826, and was transferred to the New-England Southern Conference in 1841.

—Capt. Frank Toner of the Central Police District, Baltimore, died yesterday of heart trouble. He had been on the Baltimore police force twenty-five years, and no man in the department was more highly valued or respected. He was forty-seven years old.

—Isabella Margaret Sewell, the sister of United States Senator William J. Sewell, died at her brother's home in Camden, N. J., yesterday. The funeral services will be held Friday. The interment will be at Tarrytown, N. Y.

—William H. Rosch, a war veteran, well-known throughout Menmouth County, N. J., died yesterday at Oceanport, aged sixty-eight years.

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
